

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF



Greetings!

2023 was an extremely unique year for the Department and the County in general. With flood events in January, February and March, all departments within the County were busy. Between March 9 and 14, the Department received approximately 400 calls for service. This is an unprecedented number of calls in such a short period of time. Flooding affected homes, rivers, creeks, and farmland throughout the County. In March alone, approximately 455 structures had damage due to flooding and 100+roads were closed due to flooding and/or damage.

The floods of 2023 were an event only seen

every 50 to 100 years. The main difference between the big fires we have had in the County in recent years, compared to the flooding last year, is that fires affect a small geographic area. The floods affected the entire County. Historic numbers of Tulare County residents were under evacuation warnings and orders for their homes at the same time.

Throughout the incident there were over 120 water rescues, and over 700 people were working on the flooding at the height of the floods in March. We would like to extend our thanks to the many cooperating agencies that helped us provide the citizens of Tulare County with the needed access to emergency services.

Even with all of the challenges to the start of 2023 we were able to make strides in our lease apparatus program and put 7 new apparatus in to use throughout the County. These new apparatuses allow our firefighters to respond appropriately to emergencies throughout the county.

We appreciate all the understanding and support from our citizens throughout the County during our challenging start to 2023. You are why we do what we do every single day.


HISTORY

The Tulare County Fire Department (TCFD) was established on July 1, 2007. Prior to 2007, the County of Tulare contracted with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, know today as CAL FIRE, to provide fire protection for the County. Through the agreement, CAL FIRE provided personnel to staff the Counties fire apparatus and fire stations as well as administrative staff to manage the Department.


The current Fire Chief was appointed by the Board of Supervisors in January 2016 and is the Department's third Chief. The Department's original Command Staff included three Division Chiefs as well as the Fire Chief. The Department embraced field operations and reduced the Division Chief positions to two during the economic recession. A third Division Chief was added to the Department's Command Staff in November 2018. The Department currently has an Operations, Training and Professional Standards division.

The Department's fire stations were originally staffed with one person. Paid Call Fire Fighters, who later became classified as Extra Help Fire Fighters, supplement staffing. Today, the Department staffs four of its stations with two personnel on each shift and continues to rely on Extra Help Fire Fighters to supplement staffing.

The Department moved its headquarters from its original location in Farmersville, CA, to 835 S. Akers St. in Visalia, CA in September 2017. The Tulare County Emergency Operations Center is located in the Fire Department Headquarters which is next to the Tulare County Sheriff's Department. The co-location of the County's emergency services allows for collaboration between the three Departments to improve services for the residents of the County.









Positions as of 12/31/2023

North Battalion




North Battalion has a total of 9 stations.

2-0 Staffed Stations: Station 1—Visalia Station 4—Cutler/Orosi Station 8—Ivanhoe








East Battalion has a total of 10 stations.

2-0 Staffed Stations: Station 21—Terra Bella




East Battalion accounted for 27.91% of our calls for service.

OPERATIONS UPDATE



2023 2022



In 2023, we placed new units in service in the communities of Ivanhoe (Engine 8) and Earlimart (Engine 28). We ordered and received a large purchase of

Hurst eDraulics air bags and Rescue 42's to outfit all of our new equipment and replace our old and outdated extrication equipment. We were able to add three (3) much needed Fire Apparatus Engineer positions to our staffing. We also worked diligently with Facilities and General Services to start the remodel of Station 21, Terra Bella. We were also able to purchase Zonehaven (Genasys) Emergency Alerting System for County wide use.



New Equipment

Two (2) new Type 3 Fire Engines from Emergency Vehicle Group and Spartan Fire. Type 3 Fire Engines are commonly referred to as Wildland Engines and are specifically designed to assist in fighting fires in the mountain areas, but are also designed to handle all type of emergencies. These 2 new Wildland Engines already have numbers and have been assigned to Springville Station #22 and Alpaugh Station #9.


